- Meeting Preparation with State Senator Dahle- Chief Dutch provided an updated PowerPoint presentation and will send it out to the Finance Committee members and Karen Mulvany for review. Director Gilcrest will reach out to Dahle's office to schedule a date for the presentation.
- AdastraGov Programing- The program will be presented to the Board of Directors when totally operational at the August Board meeting.
- UAL White Paper- A work in progress by Chief Dutch is placed on hold.
- Educational Scholarships- The El Dorado Community Foundation will provide a proposal regarding scholarships. We are waiting for their response.
- JPA Budget Update- The JPA is meeting with the County to modify the
 current fixed rate contract. The JPA is waiting for a response. JPA regularly
 discusses the best medic unit placement. Discussions include scenarios
 where medic unit call volumes and population demographics like age
 growth, decline and so on are taken in to consideration.
- Lexipol Fire Grant Service- Lexipol provided a presentation of their grant services. The Finance Committee recommends that the EDCFPD engage Lexipol's subscription service for their Grant Assistance Platform for Grant Research, Alerts, Consulting and Review for a 2-year contract costing six thousand dollars which also includes a 50% reduction in cost of Grant writing Services subject to Chief Cordero calling 5 references of five special fire districts in California using the Lexipol Grant services.

11. FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT:

- JPA:
 - The Executive Director and Deputy Executive Director continue to meet with the Countyregarding the current JPA contract for additional funding. JPA Board meeting July 28th.
 - EMSOC, reviewing move-up cover policies pilot study for nighttime cover assignments
 - with a goal to reduce the nighttime cover assignment impacts on our personnel.
 Reviewing/updating policy manuals, IFT's and handling of IFT's.
 - A request has been made to the JPA for amending our current agreement regarding the FF1 requirement for hiring paramedics. Pending JPA Board and Fire District Board approval.
- American Rescue Plan Act reviewed at staff meeting, working on the last couple
 of items. Packet will be submitted prior to July 31st deadline.
- Hiring Update:
 - Chief Lohan and I held Chiefs' interviews on July 16th, 5 job offers were made an accepted. We have 1 additional FF/P coming online in approximately 2 weeks. These 6positions will place at plus 2 towards the 3 Board directed 3 floaters.
- City of Placerville
 - o Continue to work with City staff, attending staff meetings and City Council.
 - Attended out first meeting with the consultants, city staff and fire staff identifying broadneeds, locations and pathway forward. Additional information on potential future growth was provided to the consultants. We completed our survey needs, current and future, submitted to Dewberry.
 - Attended a special City Council meeting to discuss the current homeless

- situation and fire season. The City is working with the County for possible solutions.
- Working with City Staff, Placerville PD, Cal-Trans and CHP on highway 50 traffic mitigation during "Apple Hill" Season. Looking at a weekend in September and October.

Fire Prevention update

- Captain Stirling and Captain Shepard are working through some of the preventionprocesses and looking for areas to modernize and streamline the bureau.
- We are also working on updating the Fire Marshal job description and will need to move forward on filling that position soon.
- Completed the July 4th fireworks show at the fairgrounds, without any incident.
 Thankyou to Captain Stirling, Shepard, Engines 25 & 28 along with Cal Fire.

District information

- Engine 17 is currently at station 21 for equipment outfitting and training.
 Some equipment is still pending; however, work continues for the in-service of the engine.
- Update on Station 28, Chief Williams met with the project manager, contractor and engineer to review the issues with Station 28. Recommended actions were to have the concrete joint caulked and sealed throughout the exterior of the station and in the bays. Consider removing rear landscaping and replace with concrete to avoid water seeping under the station and concrete areas. Chief Williams is working on getting bids for the repairs.
- Director Gilchrest and I attended the recent Taxpayers Association meeting to provide insight on the District. The meeting was well received, with good interactive dialogue.
- Attended an online Zoom meeting with multiple Chiefs', LAFCO staff and the consultants regarding the MSR. Our requested comments, edits and changes have been submitted to the consultants for review. Our request is to a clear representation of our district in the MSR.
- o LAFCO Commissioner update: Brian Veerkamp 4 yr term, Tim Palmer 2 yr term
- The district is currently going through our ISO review, along with several other agencies in the County. Staff will be meeting with the ISO representative(s) on August 6th.
- o WT-21 was hired out to Cal Fire on July 18 & 19 for coverage from Station 21.
- Staff met with the Red Hawk Casino to review the hotel, which is under construction, along with the upcoming event center. There will be additional meetings as the projectmoves through construction. We will also be involved with training when the construction company brings in a sky crane. We will be reaching out to other agencies for this training as well.
- The district website is under construction by Streamline, staff is working on completing the necessary training to bring the new site online.
- National Night Out is August 3rd, we will be participating in several locations across the district. We attended a planning meeting with the City of Placerville for coordination.

Director Gilchrest stated he knows that the Board approached the Satisfaction Survey with the best intent but with the process, it was not done well at all. Director Gilchrest stated he would like to adjust the process, come back, and send out a Satisfaction Survey for all the reasons they said they would do it but follow the proper process and procedure so that its clean and within good governance. He believes the only way to do that is to run the survey through a third party, so it doesn't put the board at a point for insurance purposes to question if the board unintentionally broke a statue or caused a problem to occur. Director Gilchrest said he believes the survey should be repeated every two years. Director Gilchrest stated that in his research he found that US Congress put an Act in 2004 and renewed it every 2 years, that every Federal Agency shall conduct a satisfaction survey.

12. FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT:

• JPA:

- The JPA Board and legal counsel for the JPA are working through some issues with the County. The Board is committed to working through these items and have been actively engaged as a Board with our legal.
- EMSOC, reviewing move-up cover policies we have implemented a change under a pilot program for after hour move up and cover assignments, we will be tracking this over a 3-month period and then reevaluate for additional changes or a policy change.
- A request has been made to the JPA for amending our current agreement regarding the FF1 requirement for hiring paramedics. The JPA Board has pushed the item to County Fire Ops, then Chiefs for further discussion surrounding the operational impacts and looking to resolve associated concerns.
- American Rescue Plan Act We submitted our requests for funding via the County ARPA funds, totaling \$2,144,122.46. The County CAO's office distributed a letter to the fire districts regarding an additional \$100 million for special districts under AB128 & SB129, however to date there is not an application process or direction on how to apply for these funds and/or parameters for funding consideration. Our district, along with others, submitted this information to CAO's office along with our needs for funding the requested item. There has not been information provided by the County pertaining to any timelines for approval and/or disbursement of awarded funds.
- Hiring Update:
 - We have a total of 4 new recruits that will begin their training academy on September 20, under the leadership of FF/P Derek Duncan. The training will take place over 3 weeks. We had one prospective employee back out of the process last week. We have made 2 additional job offers, which were accepted, and they have begun the pre-employment process.
 - We have received resignations from 2 employees, a Captain who has accepted a position with a FD in Idaho and a FF who accepted a position with the City of Stockton Fire Department.

City of Placerville

- Continue to work with City staff, attending staff meetings and City Council.
- Dewberry Consulting continues to work on the Public Safety Building, staff provided them several requested worksheets for space needs and future needs. There has been a pause on the project work due to the Caldor Fire.
- The city is working with the County on a "managed" homeless camp, this is a large undertaking and collaborative across all the stake holders our district included. Meetings were canceled due to the Caldor Fire; however, they are being rescheduled in

the next couple of weeks. Our involvement is primarily centered around the fire prevention / building / fire-life safety inspections for any new facility.

• The "trip the green" program we have been working on with the City, CHP and Cal-Trans was utilized during the evacuation process that took place early into the Caldor Fire, which was successful. Our pre-work and testing paid off for this need. As for the planned test weekends later this month and next, all parties have agreed to push the trials until next fall, given Caldor Fire and Hwy 50 closures, it is unclear if we would get "true" data from the pilot program. The program is built and ready to go once dates are identified for next year.

• Fire Prevention update

• Captain Stirling and Captain Shepard are working with the County FPO's regarding the burn ban discussion and reviewing our current ordinance(s) as they pertain to outdoor burning, campfires, cooking fires etc. The FPO's made a presentation to County Chiefs', with a plan developed moving forward.

• District information

- We have had several structure fires over the past couple of weeks, unfortunately a fatal fire off Tai Pan Rd in the Thompson Hill area, another fire in Sierra Springs off Lupine Lane we did receive support from units on the Caldor Fire in the area and last night a fire in Camino. All are under investigation from by our FPO's with Captain Preston taking the lead.
- Engine 17 is in-service at Station 17, some loose equipment continues to come in, however, the unit is fully outfitted. We had planned for a September 4th open house, given the Caldor Fire and the evacuations that was canceled. We'll look for another opportunity in the fall for this event.
- We have also had several delays in apparatus repairs, due to access to parts. Currently an engine is waiting on a part which was 70 days out upon order. This is an issue across the nation, not just locally or fire apparatus.
- We were invited again this year for the annual 9/11 Ceremony at El Dorado Adventist School. Engine and Medic 25 along with myself attended. I had the honor of being the guest speaker this year.
- Update on Station 28, Chief Williams is currently receiving bids for the caulking job needed for Station 28. The bid should be awarded this week or next, to have the work completed before the winter weather hopefully arrives.
- The district has begun the initial phases of our ISO review process, our first meeting was canceled due to the River Fire (affecting our ISO rep) and the re-scheduled meeting was canceled due to the Caldor Fire. We are currently looking for dates in October to continue the process.
- LAFCO Commissioner update there is another vacancy on the LAFCO Commission, which will require another ballot process TBD. The Executive Officer has resigned, and the Commission is currently engaging in a recruitment process.
- The district website is under construction by Streamline, staff is working on completing the necessary training to bring the new site online.

Enclosed is your renewal proposal for the 11/1/2021-2022 term. As we do every year, we negotiated with the carrier to procure the best renewal possible. As we previously noted with the conditional renewal notice, this year was a very difficult renewal negotiation process.

Many markets are not writing business in California due to the severity of the Employment Practices claims and drastically increased Wildfire Risk. FirePlus was the only carrier willing to look at the entire group of districts. Your individual district's rate may have increased more or less than other members this year as the goal was to continue to be sure we had a product to offer every member. There is a strong urge from the company to non-renew any business with adverse loss history and/or high wildfire risk. We understand that could have left many members without any remotely similar option of coverage. It has always been the goal of the group to attempt to continue to be able to offer coverage to every member. The Southern California Fire District program (FAIRA), who is also insured with FirePlus, took a much higher rate increase than NCFDA. They realized, although painful, it was their best option as well. The coverage provided under the policy is still extremely robust and comprehensive. Please review your proposal carefully so you are aware of changes.

The following items are the renewal requirements needed prior to the 11/1/21 renewal:

- Terrorism Disclosure sign, date and mark the appropriate box if you haven't already done so. Your quote will indicate the Terrorism Premium but if have already chosen to exclude the coverage, your invoice will reflect the lower premium amount.
- Review the vehicle schedule on the quote for accuracy and notify us of any discrepancies. Any changes requested after 7/25/21 may not be reflected on the quote but will follow by endorsement once the renewal is issued.
- Please return your check payment payable to ISU ATWOOD AGENCY via mail, according to your enclosed invoice.

If you have any questions, please contact us. Please try to get the information and payment back to us as quickly as possible as we know this is coming later than normal due to the length of the negotiations. We also understand many of you are working very hard on the fires that have hit so hard. Please know we are willing to work with you in any way possible to get this renewal done. Thank you so much for your dedication and service during these very difficult times!

Subject: Plan Review Fees for Commercial Generators

The plan review process for El Dorado County Fire requires the following for the installation of commercial generators:

- (1) Application submittal with project plans and payment of 372.00.
- (2) Plan review to ensure the project complies with the 2019 CFC, CBC, CEC, Local Ordinance, and NFPA standards.
- (3) Final site inspection for compliance and sign off. This fee includes 1 re-inspection if needed.

An ordinance of the El Dorado County Fire Protection District (ECFPD) adopting the 2019 Edition of the *California Fire Code*, incorporating the 2018 Edition of the *International Fire Code*, regulating and governing the safeguarding of life and property from fire and explosion hazards arising from the storage, handling and use of hazardous substances, materials and devices, and from conditions hazardous to life or property in the occupancy of buildings and premises in the El Dorado County Fire Protection District; providing for the issuance of permits and collection of fees.

- Section 106 Fees

- <u>106.6 Permit, Plan Review and Inspection Fees</u> shall be added as follows: A schedule of fees adopted by the district board of directors for plan review, inspections and the issuance of permits by the district may be found in the most current district fee schedule (Health & Safety Code 17951).
- 106.6.1 Cost Recovery Fees shall be added as follows: Fire service fees may be charged to any person, firm, corporation or business that through negligence, violation of the law, or as a result of carelessness, is responsible for the cause of the district to respond to the scene of an incident. A district board may charge a fee to cover the cost of any service which the district provides or the cost of enforcing any regulation for which the fee is charged (Health & Safety Code 13916). The fee shall not exceed the actual cost of suppressing the fire and/or responding to the scene of an incident.



El Dorado County Fire Protection District Board,

Thank you for taking the time to consider a waiver of our commercial generator permit fee. We are a small special state district in Pilot Hill that serves as a Parks and Recreation District for the Divide area. (Georgetown, Garden Valley, Kelsey, Greenwood, Cool and Pilot Hill) We are fortunate that we received grant monies to pursue an upgrade of our Bayley Barn. The Bayley Barn helps to provide revenue to fund our youth/recreation programs and park/ facility improvements for our community. We were hit hard when we were forced to cancel all our events during Covid and completely refunded our fees to our customers. It will take a considerable amount of time to recover that revenue.

When planning for the Bayley Barn grant project we asked our contractor to draw up plans and apply for any permits needed for our generator. El Dorado County Building and Planning indicated a signature would be needed from the local fire department.

The contractor traveled to 4 fire stations within El Dorado County but could not find anyone that knew what procedure should be followed to obtain the permit. The permit had no instructions and there were no boxes to select for a generator install. We were working within the grant timeline, so the generator was installed and we find our district in a situation without the funds to pay for this permit or the ability to charge the grant for the expense. We are asking for your help in this matter and would so appreciate if the board would waive this fee for our district.

INSTANT RUNOFF ELECTION PROCESS

Introduction

The following procedure implements the instant runoff voting method for determining the winner in a fictional "Central Division Director" election. A process, similar to the one explained below, will be utilized in determining the LAFCO Special District representative.

Ballot Specifications and Directions to Voters

A voting ballot shall allow a voter to rank candidates for the Central Division Director in order of choice. All candidates are listed on the ballot with one additional slot for a write-in candidate. The voter may include no more than one write-in candidate among his/her ranked choices. Directions provided to voters shall conform substantially to the following specifications:

Vote for candidates by indicating your first-choice candidate, your second-choice candidate and so on. Indicate your first choice by marking the number "1" beside a candidate's name, your second choice by marking the number "2" by that candidate's name, your third choice by marking the number "3," and so on, for as many choices as you wish. You are free to rank only one candidate, but ranking additional candidates cannot help defeat your first-choice candidate. Please do not mark the same number beside more than one candidate and do not skip numbers.

Ballot Counting

The ballots cast shall be tabulated and the result declared by the Central Division Election Coordinator after review by the Central Division Election Review Committee using the following procedure:

- The first choice marked on each ballot shall be counted. If any candidate receives a majority of the first choices, that candidate shall be declared elected.
- If no candidate receives a majority of first choices, the candidate who received the
 fewest first choices shall be eliminated and each vote cast for that candidate shall
 be transferred to the next-ranked candidate on that voter's ballot. If, after this
 transfer of votes, any candidate has a majority of the votes from the continuing
 ballots, that candidate shall be declared elected.
- If no candidate receives a majority of votes from the continuing ballots after a
 candidate has been eliminated and his/her votes have been transferred to the nextranked candidate, the continuing candidate with the fewest votes from the

continuing ballots shall be eliminated. All votes cast for that candidate shall be transferred to the next-ranked continuing candidate on each voter's ballot. This process of eliminating candidates and transferring their votes to the next-ranked continuing candidates shall be repeated until a candidate receives a majority of the votes from the continuing ballots. This candidate shall be declared elected.

Example:

There are three candidates: Smith, Jones and Marks. 60 ballots are submitted with the following results:

- Smith is ranked 1 by 25 voters
- Jones is ranked 1 by 20 voters
- Marks is ranked 1 by 15 voters.

In the first round no one receives a majority (31 votes). Thus, Marks is eliminated and those ballots that had Marks ranked 1 are reviewed for their second choice.

- Smith is ranked 2 on 10 of the of the 15 ballots
- Jones is ranked 2 on 3 of the 15 ballots.

Thus, Smith wins with 35 votes and Jones is second with 23 votes. (Note: In this example, only 13 votes were counted in round two because two of the Marks ballots only voted for first choices.)

Agenda Item; Outside Agency Good Governance Policies Preliminary Report by Paul Gilchrest. Presented 14-Sep-2021

This report provides an overview of research performed to date. In the next several months and before the end of 2021 recommendations will be provided so as to drive good governance application within all areas of the El Dorado County Fire Protection District. This will be accomplished with Good Governance principles to create the necessary policy.

The process followed was to research various entities associated with either the development and or application of "Good Governance" with local government entities. Thus far three publications are referenced; Institute for Local Government, Counterpoint; Why Special Districts Promote Good Governance and Special District Leadership Foundation.

1) Institute for Local Government

a. Good Governance Checklist; Good and Better Practices

- i. The Institute for Local Government (ILG) has created a checklist to help elected officials, county administrative officers, city managers, agency counsel, local agency staff and the community-at-large answer these fundamental questions. Some of the "good practices" are those necessary to comply with California law. Others set the agency's sights higher and take good practices to a level of "better practices."
- ii. The checklist combines legal requirements included in California law as well as practices suggested by the following resources:
 - Government Finance Officers Association's best practices,
 - League of California Cities City Managers Department, "Transparency and Your City Self-Assessment Checklist
 - California Special District Leadership Foundation
 - Sunshine Review
- iii. The checklist divided into four areas and sub-areas as well as Minimum Standard Practices and Beyond the Minimum / Better Practices.

b. Based on several years of service as a Director on the Board, my preliminary assessment pertaining to the Minimum Standard Practices is mixed. When looking at the "Better Practices" it is my perception significant work is needed in these areas.

At this point my recommendation would be that the Board form an add-hock committee to perform a deep dive review with staff and assess how the EDCF performing / operating in relation to this check list. The purpose to understand the gaps and develop a program as part of the district's to fully meet all Minimum Standard Practices as well as begin to tie in Beyond the Minimum / Better Practices

2) Counterpoint: Why Special Districts Promote Good Governance

How Special Districts in California Are being Open, Accountable, and Connected. Article highlights are noted here;

a. Striving to Meet Unmet Needs;

- i. ... special districts are community-owned agencies, governed by a board of community residents to deliver specialized services to the community
- ii. Rarely does a one-size-fits-all approach provide viable solutions to our nation's vastly diverse communities and their unique challenges.
- iii. Since 1997 (the United States conducts its census of local governments every five years, for years ending in 2 and 7), the number of special districts in California has declined 5 percent, while the number nationwide grew by 10 percent during that same period.
- iv. This is particularly significant given that the population in California and presumably the demand for services has increased by nearly 21 percent since 1997. There are now fewer special districts serving substantially more residents in California than there were 20 years ago.
- v. Currently, there are more than 2,070 independent special districts in California.

b. Heart of public engagement;

- i. special districts foster qualitative public engagement
- ii. Special districts often provide greater responsiveness to their community than other forms of government



- iii. All levels of government have advantages and disadvantages, and all levels of government have room to improve.
- iv. Most people do not have the time or inclination to regularly monitor their local government
- v. When residents have an issue want somebody from their community who will listen, and who can take action. Special districts do that.

c. Checking the Accountability Wish List;

- i. special districts foster qualitative public engagement
- ii. Special districts in California must meet a wide range of public accountability laws, many of which exceed those governing state and federal governments. These Laws include;
 - Open meetings
 - California Public Records Act
 - Municipal service reviews
 - Regular financial audits
 - Ethics training
 - Political Reform Act
 - Right to Vote on Taxes Act
 - Compensation disclosure and financial reports
- iii. Beyond California's robust statutory standards for special districts, the Special District Leadership Foundation (SDLF), a nonprofit 501(c)(3) established to promote good governance for special districts, promotes transparency through its district transparency certificate of excellence program.
- iv. More than 100 districts in California have received the SDLF certificate, which ensures special districts provide key governance and finance information on their websites and conduct special community outreach and engagement.
- v. The California Special Districts Association (CSDA) has partnered with Streamline, a business affiliate, to offer districts affordable websites that make compliance with the SDLF transparency requirements clear, simple, and efficient.

d. Special Districts Leading the Way;

- i. Chino Valley Independent Fire District. CVIFD became the first fire-protection district in California to receive the SDLF District of Distinction accreditation in 2008.
- ii. **Cucamonga Valley Water District.** CVWD demonstrates open government through use of its website, social media, and active community engagement.



- iii. **Palm Springs Cemetery District.** PSCD is a member of five cities' chambers of commerce and regularly presents to businesses, service organizations, and other local governments.
- iv. **McKinleyville Community Services District.** Although not incorporated as a city, McKinleyville is the third largest community in Humboldt County.



3) Special District Leadership Foundation

5020.10

The Secretary to the Board, in cooperation with the Board Chairman and the Fire Chief, shall prepare an agenda for each regular special meeting of the Board of Directors. Any Director may call the Secretary to the Board and request any item to be placed on the agenda no later than 4:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday of the month.

5020.20

Any member of the public may request that a matter directly related to District business be placed on the agenda of a regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Directors, subject to the following conditions:

5020.21

The request must be in writing and be submitted to the Secretary of the Board together with supporting documents and information, if any, by the first Tuesday of the month.

5020.22

The Secretary to the Board and/or Fire Chief shall be the sole judge of whether the public request is or is not a "matter directly related to District business."

5020.23

No matter which is legally a proper subject for consideration by the Board in closed session will be accepted under this policy.

5020.24

The Board of Directors may place limitations on the total time to be devoted to a public request issue at any meeting, and may limit the time allowed for any one person to speak on the issue at the meeting.

5020.30

This policy does not prevent the Board from taking testimony at regular and special meetings of the Board on matters that are not on the agenda that a member of the public may wish to bring before the Board. However, the Board shall not discuss or take action on such matters at that meeting.

5020.40

At least seventy-two (72) hours prior to the time of all regular meetings, an agenda, which includes but is not limited to all matters on which there may be discussion and/or action by the Board, shall be posted conspicuously for public review within the District office.

5020.41


The agenda for a special meeting shall be posted at least twenty-four (24) hours before the meeting in the same location.








E17 September 2021 Statistics Comparison






E25 Monthly Statistics Comparison






E28 Monthly Statistics Comparison




