Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) Funds

The latest updates

The County CAO's Office again this year provided Agencies, including Fire Districts, to submit requests for funding via the County's TOT revenue. As you may recall, last year was the first opportunity for us to make these requests, which we did seeking reimbursement for our calls within the USFS areas. In anticipation of these funds being available again this year, we created a "tourism call" box within Firehouse for better tracking. This year we submitted for approximately \$69,000 reimbursement for tourism calls, a replacement U-72 tow vehicle, equipment to outfit our rafts, startup funds for a drone program (training and equipment) and a trailer and misc. equipment for the new side by side for Station 17. This past Monday, the Board of Supervisors approved our request as part of their 2022/23 budget. Thank you for everyone who made sure to document tourism calls within Firehouse, as it made the reporting a lot easier and efficient.

New Type III OES Engine coming to **County Fire**

El Dorado County Fire District, and the previous Pollock Pines - Camino Fire Department, have been partnering with OES for fire apparatus and mutual aid responses since pre-1980's. Pollock Pines - Camino Fire Department originally had OES-176, which was replaced by OES-HRF 1 (Heavy Rescue Fire) in the late 1980's. OES 258 took the place of HRF 1 in the mid 1990's and remained with the District until 2015 when we received OES 372, now 4103. While we continue to support OES with their mutual aid system, it became clear that OES 4103 isn't the ideal piece of equipment for our District, for a variety of reasons. We have reached out to OES the past couple of years to inquire on the possibility of exchanging OES 4103 for a Type 3 engine, which would be better suited for our needs. This request has been unsuccessful.

With the incident involving Engine 319 this past winter, the District again reached out to OES to see about obtaining a Type 3 engine in lieu of the current engine, which again was unsuccessful. Through discussions with our OES Chief, the District has entered into an agreement with OES to receive a Type 3 engine under a similar agreement as OES 4103. This request was approved by OES and the District will be receiving OES 4310 in the next few weeks. This Type 3 engine will be housed at Station 19, for use by our crews while Engine 319 is being repaired. The engine will be available for requests and responses via the normal OES channels. As we have done over the past couple of years, we will need to monitor our staffing levels for availability to staff and respond our OES apparatus. Our apparatus, both OES and ECF is tracked for availability within the OES Google Docs.

Responses are flexible with OES, as they recognize the staffing challenges most agencies in California are dealing with.

IFT Pilot Program Update

We are almost a month into the IFT Pilot Program at the JPA level and everyone should be seeing a dramatic reduction in the requests for these services. This change has been a long time coming and is needed to reduce the additional burden placed on our personnel and 911 services.

While there have been some ongoing challenges in keeping this change moving forward as presented with the County, the JPA Board is committed to holding our position and not utilizing our 911 units and personnel to handle these services. While there have been a few adjustments made to the original proposed Pilot Program, the overall reduction of medical transports and impacts to our system is evident. We are continuing to monitor the pilot program and are looking for permanent solutions.

Follow up on ARPA Funding

The latest updates

The County Board of Supervisors allocated \$500,000 of their ARPA funding to the fire agencies in El Dorado County - East & West Slope, the Fire Chiefs Association determined a methodology for disbursement of allocations per staffed engine company. Each district received a minimum of 1 staffed engine company allotment of \$22,727. EČF is eligible for a total of \$113,635.00, which is being used for uniforms and PPE for personnel. Chief Lohan and Kathleen are working on sizing of personnel to issue these new sets of uniforms. The uniform pants being purchased will meet the single layer wildland standard, with accompanying Class B shirts. We will also be replacing approximately 25 of our wildland jackets and Carhartt winter jackets with these funds. Uniforms and PPE are approved purchases with the ARPA funds.
